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Young Fives

During September, the students in Young Fives have been very busy learning about Westdale. We have learned about many people and places at Westdale. The students have also been practicing how to be safe, responsible, and respectful. We have also been working on getting along with our new friends in Young Fives. Kindergarten

Our Kindergarten reading program includes one story each week. We learn 5 "Amazing Words" that enrich our vocabulary, 2 word wall words, and phonics skills. Students are also learning to retell the stories we read. You can help your child at home by reading stories to them for 20 minutes each night then talking about the books. These should be books that they pick out and enjoy.

In math you can help your child by counting any time you can. They can count toys and snacks. Play a game asking them "How Many?" and "Which is more or less?" This will build basic number sense.

First Grade

First grade is off to a great start! We are continuing to work on our routines and Wolf Ways Expectations. We are currently working on short vowels and story elements in reading. Also, we have begun reading groups as well as independent work stations. In math we are practicing addition. Ask your student to show you what a number bond is! We look forward to seeing you at conferences on October 15-16th and Math University on October 22!

Music News

Hello from the music room. The children have been happily making music for four weeks now, and it gets better each day! In kindergarten, the students learned about the different voices that we use in music class and in school. We then went on to study how music is made, and discovered our own found sounds! Keep singing your color songs, kindergarteners! The first graders have been working on keeping the steady beat, playing instruments on the beat, and finding the strong beat in music. We've been doing a lot of movement activities and have learned songs from other countries. In second grade we are beginning to read music, noticing where the treble clef is, what a staff is, and how notes are placed on the staff. Finally, we've been talking about where to find the title and the composer of music we are reading. ~Mrs. Casler

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Second Grade

We are having a "Math" tastic time in Second Grade, but we could use some extra practice at home in order to be prepared and successful with future math skills. Speed and accuracy ("Fluency", truly knowing the facts) is essential to future success. Daily practice can be fun and easy.

Encourage students to use the unused portion of their <u>Rocket Math</u> for 1 min. timed "point and practice", 1 min. timed oral read and answer, 1 min. timed write in answer.

Fall into a Good Book Mrs. Vauhkonen and Mrs. Sprague Literacy/Numeracy Specialist As you set up after school routines this fall, please remember to make time to read at home every day. Reading every day or you reading aloud to your child will help your child succeed in school. Establish a regular time and place to read. Reading every day for at least 20 minutes is more beneficial than reading for longer periods of time on a less frequent basis. Encourage your child to pick their own books; don't forget to visit the public library. Read favorite books over and over. Be an expressive reader and encourage your child to do the same. Read a variety of material: books, magazines, newspapers, etc. Ask questions about the story as you read. Make predictions about what will happen next. Discuss books after you read them, this will help your child think about their reading. Most of all, ENJOY the time spent together reading with your child! From the Parking Lot: Nice job to all the kids who are getting out of vehicles quickly every morning! This helps eliminate traffic sitting on Center Road and allows for buses to get into the parking lot. Some students need assistance getting out of the vehicle, but if your child is able to quickly and independently exit your vehicle, that works best!
