#### A Message from our Superintendent

Welcome back to another school year at the Saginaw Township Community Schools! I'm writing this message in the early days of August. Excitement is building as we put the tumultuous 2021-22 school year to bed and turn our thoughts to a very promising 2022-23 academic year.

I shared three years ago that one of our family traditions is to spend some time at a campground in Ludington, Michigan, on a summer vacation with a few other families. I also shared my love for Michigan's

beautiful lighthouses, several of my favorites being in or near Ludington. I explained my vision that STCS be seen as a "lighthouse" for families and residents in our community and region to help guide them through the challenging job of educating and raising kids in today's turbulent world. My vision is that the wonderful businesses and services in our township view the school district as a rock-solid foundation upon which partnerships are nurtured and our economic base is strengthened. My vision is that our thousands of alumni feel connected, view our current efforts and achievements with pride, and harken back to their own positive experiences at STCS.

It's been a really busy summer, so allow me to share a few district updates:

Since our oldest school (Hemmeter Elementary) is 85 years old and our newest (Heritage High School) is 51 years old, we've been working hard to address increasing demands from aging facilities at STCS. Four main developments illustrate these efforts:

- 1. We've spent the past year completing an intensive facilities' study with the help of our architects and construction managers. After inviting the community for building tours and visioning sessions in June, the Board of Education is now finalizing a plan to present to sample groups in September in hopes of soliciting feedback on how best to address our aging facilities and provide students with the best possible learning environment into the future. Over the next nine months, we hope to develop a plan that makes sense, is financially responsible, and takes care of our amazing kids!
- 2. Join me in welcoming Mr. Charles (Chip) Lynch as our new Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds. Chip comes to us after successful tenures with the Lapeer Community Schools, West Bloomfield School District, Flint Community Schools, and McLaren Hospital. Chip brings a great deal of expertise and experience to the position and we are excited to have him leading this very important department.
- 3. We are in the midst of two major projects utilizing Sinking Fund dollars approved by our community in August 2018.
- -The first project is a replacement of the underground electrical lines, transformer, and switch gears feeding our White Pine Middle School campus. We've been frustrated with intermittent power problems at WPMS, so this project is long overdue. The project will be ready for staff and students to report for the start of school, then will be finalized over the Christmas holiday break.
- -The second project is a replacement of the heating and ventilation system at Mackinaw High School. Crews have been working all summer

to replace the boilers and classroom ventilation units, as well as the digital controls to manage the system. We are pleased that this project will also be ready for students to arrive for the start of school.

4. The STCS Board of Education recently supported a rebuild of the structure housing the Sherwood Pool. We closed the pool in February after damage to the pool building arose due to a broken dehumidifier control unit. The control unit was ordered in November and due to supply chain issues, still has not arrived. After weighing several options, including a total demolition of the pool, the Board chose to move forward with repairs and renovations to the structure. Between our adult exercise classes, lifeguard training classes, and student swimming lessons, the Sherwood Pool gets a great deal of use from our community, so we are working with our construction manager and architects to begin that rebuilding process.

In the area of safety, I can't help but share my excitement over a recent gift from the Saginaw Township Trustees. After a detailed process, we have been granted a full-time School Resource (Police) Officer for White Pine Middle School. Officer Jeff Fenton (STPD) has been selected for this important position and will become part of the WPMS staff in mid-August. Officer Fenton joins Officer Andy Carlson (SRO at Heritage HS) in building relationships and connecting with our students on a daily basis. I'm so thankful for the township granting us this critical position and am eager to see the positive impact Officer Fenton will have on our campus. We work hard to maintain a wonderful partnership with STPD and are appreciative of the protection and reassurance they provide our community!

We've also focused on being wise stewards of the federal-stimulus funding released to school districts over the past two years. Recent purchases include:

- -New instructional materials in high school social studies, middle and high school math, high school business, high school psychology, middle and high school drama, and K-12 physical education
- -K-12 classroom libraries and audiobooks
- -Air-purification units in every classroom and office throughout the district
- -Security cameras throughout the district
- -Numerous technology upgrades, including desktop computers, touchscreen teaching panels for each classroom, and a variety of online instructional licenses and subscriptions
- -Elementary and White Pine playground renovations (coming soon)
  And much more (for a complete listing, see our website at

Again, our goal is to develop the Saginaw Township Community Schools into a "lighthouse" district in Michigan that provides award-winning education and service to our community. Thanks for your ongoing support and partnership as we work together to make that a reality!

## **STCS Nutrition Services Program Information - August 2022**

\*The USDA Waiver for free meals for all students has ended. Meals will return to full pay for the 2022-2023 school year. \*

<u>PLEASE APPLY-FREE OR REDUCED SCHOOL MEAL BENEFITS:</u> Your student's eligibility for free or reduced price meals also provides the District with much needed funding for instructional and pupil support services. If you are not sure whether your children qualify or whether your children will use the meal program, please apply for free or reduced price meals anyway. Your information is completely confidential and will not be shared without your permission.

**FREE & REDUCED MEAL APPLICATIONS:** Packets will be mailed out mid-August to all households. If you have already received a preapproval letter for the 22-23 school year prior to the application packet, you do not need to fill the application out. An online version of the application is available now, by logging into your student's school meal account. (Online instructions are located on the Nutrition Services website at: <a href="https://www.stcs.org">www.stcs.org</a>, under Departments/ Nutrition Services.) The online application works best on a computer, not a phone. If you do not have access to a computer, please fill out the paper application. Only one application is necessary as long as all students are listed on the application along with the schools they will attend. Completed applications may be returned to the school office, the lunchroom cashier or mailed to the Nutrition Services Office at P.O. Box 6278, Saginaw, MI 48608. You will receive a letter notifying you of the outcome within 2 weeks from the date the application is received. If your child was approved free or reduced priced meals during the 21-22 school year from an application in this district, these benefits will continue for the first few weeks of school. However, a new application must be submitted and approved by September 30<sup>th</sup>, 2022 or benefits will be terminated until a new application is submitted and approved. Students will be expected to pay full price for meals during that time, so please get your application in as soon as possible to avoid a lapse in benefits.

MEAL PRICES AND MENUS: Student meal prices for 2022-2023 school year are as follows: Elementary breakfast is \$1.40, middle and high school breakfast is \$1.60, the elementary lunch price is \$1.85, middle school lunch is \$1.95 and high school lunch is \$2.10. The price for ala carte milk is \$.60 per 8-ounce carton. Breakfast and lunch menus will be posted on the STCS website under the Nutrition Services link prior to the start of school.

<u>PAY ONLINE:</u> All enrolled students have a <u>debit</u> account on our point of sale system. All students use an ID card or enter their ID number on a PIN pad when going through the lunch line. You may deposit money into your student's account online with a credit or debit card (\$2.00 convenience fee) or by sending cash or a check to school with your student. The money may be used to purchase breakfast, lunch, milk, or, at the middle and high schools, a la carte items. The purchase of a la carte items is not covered by the free or reduced meal program. Any balance remaining in the students account at the end of the school year automatically carries over to the next year. Online access to your student's account information is available by completing the online access request form at <a href="www.stcs.org">www.stcs.org</a>, Departments/ Nutrition Services/Online Access Request (under links). If you already have a login and password, you do not need a new one.

**BREAKFAST IS SERVED AT SCHOOL:** School breakfast will give your child a healthy start to the day. A nutritious breakfast helps students be more alert so they can learn more in class. If your students qualify for free or reduced price lunches, they also qualify for free or reduced price breakfasts, with no additional paperwork. You can't find a healthy breakfast at such a low cost (1.40 elementary and 1.60 middle and high school) anywhere else, so please plan to have your student eat breakfast with us at school. Help your child start the day right with school breakfast!

<u>SPECIAL DIETARY NEEDS:</u> If your child has a special dietary need <u>as determined by a physician</u>, we will do our best to make reasonable accommodations. The State of Michigan does require a signed form from your child's physician stating the prescribed diet and/or substitution. This form can be accessed on the Nutrition Services web page at <u>www.stcs.org</u>, Departments, Nutrition Services, Special Dietary Restrictions & Needs, and must be on file in the Nutrition Services Office in order for us to make meals substitutions.

We are very proud of the service provided by our department. We offer healthy food choices that meet the USDA's nutritional guidelines for school meals while doing our best to make the meals appealing to our students. We offer 1% white and chocolate milk. A variety of fruits, vegetables and whole grain items are served every day. All ala carte and snack items sold to students during the school day meet the USDA "Smart Snacks" guidelines. We are always looking for ways to improve our programs. Please feel free to contact us with ideas, suggestions, questions or concerns. 
## After School Club for White Pine Middle School students!

# Transportation Bus Expectations & Regulations

The following rules for student conduct related to transportation provided by the Saginaw Township Community School District are necessary to ensure the safety of all students and employees of the District. Therefore, it is the responsibility of students and their parent to become familiar and to comply with these rules. Violation of these rules may result in the suspension of transportation privileges for a period of time as determined by the building administration. It is the policy of Saginaw Township Community School District to provide safe, courteous, and regular transportation services to eligible students. All resident students living 1 ½ miles or more from their home school are eligible for District provided transportation. Transportation to and from school is a privilege not a right. Students are expected to follow the rules and procedures outlined below.

### To Sign up for Bussing:

- 1. Go to the district's web site: www.stcs.org. Click on the tab labeled Transportation
- 2. Fill out the form to request transportation

### At the Bus Stop:

- 1. Riders will be at the stop five minutes before the scheduled arrival of the bus. (Once the driver turns off the flashing red lights, no additional students will be picked up at that stop. DRIVERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO WAIT FOR TARDY STUDENTS).
- 2. Riders will remain behind the curb while waiting for the bus.
- 3. Riders will show respect for the private property near the bus stop.
- 4. Riders will stand at the designated stop until the bus comes to a complete stop and then board the bus in a single file line. Riders must not approach the bus while it is moving.
- 5. Students must not cross "no crossing allowed streets" as designated by the District when going to or from a bus stop. Students must not change bus stops without prior permission.
- 6. Riders must be on time when leaving school. DRIVERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO WAIT FOR TARDY STUDENTS.

#### On the Bus:

- 1. Riders will sit in their assigned seats.
- 2. Riders will be required to sit three to a seat when necessary.
- 3. Riders will stay in their seats and in a seated position.
- 4. Riders will conduct themselves with courtesy and consideration for others while on the bus.

#### **Riders must:**

- 1. Keep head/arms inside the bus at all times.
- 2. Talk in a quiet voice, no shouting and screaming.
- 3. Not throw anything inside the bus or out the window.
- 4. Not bring food or beverages on the bus (except for student lunches).
- 5. Refrain from using abusive, profane, or vulgar language or gestures.
- 6. Not tease, bully or fight with other students. These are serious offenses and will result in penalties.
- 7. Not use or possess tobacco, alcohol, and/or drugs on the bus or the bus stop.



# Transportation Bus Expectations & Regulations

- 8. Never use emergency windows or the emergency door to exit the bus unless in case of an actual emergency.
- 9. Not touch switches, controls, or any other bus equipment.
- 10. Not carry weapons on the bus.
- 11. Not be allowed to bring anything on the bus that cannot be carried safely on the student's lap.
- 12. Not put down windows without the driver's permission.
- 13. Not bring insects or animals on the bus. This includes reptiles and pets.
- 14. Not use cell phones on the bus.
- 15. Not do anything detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of all passengers and driver. Any conduct that diverts the driver's attention is prohibited. The driver is in charge of the bus and passengers. Riders are to follow the driver's directions at all times.

#### **Exiting the Bus:**

- 1. Riders will not leave their seats until the bus has come to a complete stop.
- 2. Use the handrail when entering or exiting.
- 3. If it is necessary to cross the road after leaving the bus, riders will: upon leaving the bus, take ten giant steps to the front of the bus within sight of the driver; look both directions, make sure all traffic has completely stopped; if safe, proceed across the road; and walk; do not run, when crossing the road.
- 4. Do not return to the bus for any reason.

Transportation Rules cont'd - Students damaging bus equipment will pay for the replacement of any damage. Only students that are eligible for transportation may ride on Saginaw Township Community School District buses. Therefore, students that are walkers, open-enrolled, or schoolof-choice may not ride the bus. Students can only ride the bus they are assigned to ride. Penalties for Violation of Bus Rules and Procedures Any act, which violates the School District Bus Rule and Regulations, will result in a referral. Bus transportation is a privilege and can be withdrawn from students exhibiting inappropriate behavior or violating safety rules. Bus Route information can be found after September 1st using Family Access on the district's www.stcs.org web site. You may also call Transportation at 797-1840.

#### **INTEGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT (IPM) NOTICE**

Saginaw Township Community Schools has adopted an Integrated Pest Management program. Inherent with this are the District's efforts to reduce pesticide use as much as possible. While it may occasionally be necessary to apply a pesticide, this program does not rely on routine pesticide applications to resolve problems. We use various techniques such as habitat alteration, sanitation, mechanical means, exclusion, etc. to prevent pest from becoming a problem.

As required by Michigan law, you will receive advanced notice of non-emergency application of a pesticide (insecticide, fungicide, or herbicide), other than bait or gel formulation, that is made to the school, school grounds, or buildings. This advance notice of a pesticide application will be given 48 hours before the application by the following two methods:

- Posting at the primary entrances to your child's school.
   The entrances that will be posted are the main entrance and those that have a sidewalk that leads directly to a parking lot.
- Posting in the common area located by the main office of the school.

Please note that notification is not given for use of sanitizers, germicides, disinfectants or anti-microbial cleaners. In certain emergencies, such as an infestation of stinging insects, pesticides may be applied without prior notice to prevent injury to students, but you will be promptly notified following any such application, via the two posting methods identified (above).

You may review the school's Integrated Pest Management program and records of any pesticide application upon request by contacting Charles Lynch, Buildings and Grounds Director at (989) 793-9711 or email at <a href="mailto:cwlynch@stcs.org">cwlynch@stcs.org</a>.

Parents or guardians of children attending the school are also entitled to receive the advance notice of a pesticide application, other than a bait or gel formulation, by first class United States mail postmarked at least 3 days before the application, if they so request. If you would like to be notified by mail, please contact the Buildings and Grounds Department at (989) 793-9711. Please give the Building and Grounds Secretary, your name, mailing address and what school(s) your child or children attend and they will put your name on the advance notification by US Mail list.



## **Skyward Family Access Directions**

Family Access is a valuable tool offered to parents. It is a way to monitor your student's progress, grades, find out what homework is due, when upcoming tests are, communicate with teachers, mark your student's absent, see report cards and transcripts and inform the school of your student's emergency contacts and medical conditions.

- Visit stcs.org
- Click on the 'Parents' tab at the top then click on 'Skyward Family Access' in the dropdown.

You should see the screen below: If you enrolled online, you will use the same email you chose to set up your account as your login and the five-digit code that was sent to you for your password. If you <u>did not enroll</u> online, choose 'Forgot your Login/Password' link. Once you access your child's account, you will see this on the right.

## To record your student absent in Skyward Family Access:

- 1. Select 'Attendance' Tab
- 2. Select 'Absence Requests'
- 3. Select 'Add Request' You should see your student's name
- 4. Select the date or dates, reason and add a comment

If there are siblings, you can also copy the absence request to their school at the same time.

By using Family Access, you have immediate access to your student's information, grades, attendance, etc. This also helps to ensure accuracy of your child's information, along with attendance, and saves time for our secretaries and teachers to be able to attend to your child each and every day! Thank you for partnering with STCS as we work together to build a bright future for your child.

\*Every year parents will be asked to update and review their information. You will have a Returning Student Verification tab that will show up at the beginning of each year, for approximately 6 weeks, for you to review and update if needed.

When it's open, it will be the second tab down on the left. Everyone is asked to complete this EACH year.

This cannot be done on your mobile device.

### Administration of Medications in School

When possible, medications should be administered outside of the school day. However, STCS recognizes the need for medication to be administered to students while they attend school. A parent may choose to administer medications at the school. Mediation must be administered in compliance with existing state and federal laws in a safe, effective manner. Due to the wide variety and complexity of medications being administered in the school setting, all staff involved will receive proper training.

A Medication Consent Form must be completed for each child and must include a parent and physician signature.

## Step By Step Preschool Child Development Center

Welcome to the Step By Step Preschool Center! Along with providing a safe and healthy learning environment for your child, our program emphasizes the growth of social, emotional, physical, and intellectual skills through a developmentally appropriate, literacy based curriculum. Community Education offers two options for preschool children ages 3-5 years of age.

The full-day program, starting on Monday August 22, is year-round, open Monday through Friday from 7 am to 6 pm. It is located in the west wing of Arrowwood School at 5410 Seidel Road in Saginaw Township. To be enrolled in the program, your child must be three to five years old, completely toilet trained, and able to feed himself/herself. The Enrichment Preschool (open Mondays through Thursdays – no Fridays) begins Monday, August 29, and runs through the school year until June 2 from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Children will need a book bag, water bottle, with a change of clothing. All belongings need to be labeled with your child's name. Snack is provided.

## STCS ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT



Bob Quinn graduated from CMU in the spring of 1967 with a major in biology and a minor in Physical Education. In the fall of 1971, he was offered a teaching and football/tennis coaching position at Douglas MacArthur High. He addition to teaching, he began to solely focus on coaching tennis which led to a 37-year tennis career with both boys' and girls' teams.

Throughout his career, he participated in White Pine Conference Tournaments, Saginaw Valley League Tournaments, MHSAA Regionals Tournaments, and Invitational Tournaments. In total, he had 230 tournament runs.

Quinn believes his passion for athletics came from his dad, who encouraged him to get involved in sports.

His favorite thing about coaching was "...working with the kids and watching them improve and compete. I always told the players that if success is all about winning, then you will be unhappy much, if not, most of the time. Measure success by how you compete, learn, and give 100 percent. Bring honor to yourself, coaches, parents, teammates. I always emphasized 3 D's and a P, Desire, Discipline, Dedication, and Pride."

His proudest moments in his coaching career included the boys team finishing 3rd in the MHSAA State Tournament in 1979 and the girls team finishing 2nd in the MHSAA State Tournament in 1981. Quinn was also inducted into the Michigan High School Tennis Coaches' Hall of Fame in 1992 and the Michigan High School Coaches' Hall of Fame in 1994.

One of his most memorable relationships through the years was with Jim Teal. In 1971, Teal started the tennis programs at Eisenhower High when Quinn took over the tennis programs at MacArthur High. For the next 17 years, the two enjoyed a competitive spirit until the two schools merged and both became Varsity and JV assistant coaches to each other. Teal eventually retired in 1993, but continued to run tournaments with Quinn until this year.

Quinn, and his wife Jeanie, retired from teaching in 2003, although he continued to coach tennis for another 5 years. Quinn has no intentions of slowing down. In the winter, he organizes a group of tennis players at the Saginaw Athletic Club three times a week, and in the summer he plays golf with a group, two to three times a week.

## Community Education K-5 After School Activities Clubs (ASAC)



Each STCS Elementary school has an After School Activities Club that is open until 6 pm. There are two daily pickup rates: by 5 pm and by 6 pm. Each ASAC center is open on half-days of school, and all students may attend at Arrowwood Center on full-days of no school. All students must be pre-registered at least 2 days prior to the first attendance date. Forms are available online at www.stcs.org/comed. Each form can be printed out and completed and returned to the Community Education office. Each center is licensed by the Department of Health and Human Services, Childcare Licensing.

After completing registration, the Weekly Schedule and Payment form must be returned, with payment, at each of your individual child's center by 6 pm Thursday the week before attending. After the first week of school, online scheduling and payment is available and you will have until Monday at 8 am to schedule for that same week. There is a \$1.75 convenience fee to use online scheduling and payment.

Rates: Normal school day pickup by 6 pm - \$10 per day per child; Half Days of School - \$22; Full Days of No School - \$26

Registration Fee: There is a registration fee of \$25 for one child or \$30 for two or more family members

If using the ASAC starting the first week of school, the Enrollment packet must include the first week's schedule with full payment and returned to the Community Education Office no later than Thursday, August 18, by 4:00 pm. If not already paid, the Registration fee must be included. If the Enrollment Packet with schedule/payment is turned in after August 18, students will be able to start attending beginning Wednesday, August 24. Please allow 2 days for processing the enrollment packet.

Pre-Paid EZ-Passes are also available for those who use the program on a periodic basis and have pre-registered their child. EZ-Passes must be purchased at least one day prior to attendance. Passes may be purchased at Community Education (797-1847). EZ-Passes are good to have on hand in case of an emergency. Rates are after school days: \$15 per day (can be used for any after school day); special days: half days of school - \$25 per day; full days no school - \$31.
