He wants everyone to know he has an open door and is ready to listen when students, staff or parents want to talk. "I want to be involved in as much as I can at the school and foster those positive relationships." School Bond Proposal to be on the May Ballot Bruce Martin - Superintendent

The Saginaw Township Community Schools Board of Education has approved placing a \$242.9 million bond proposal on the May 2 ballot. If approved by voters, the bond will finance improvements at all school facilities. The bond also will provide revenue for the demolition of three aging circular classroom pods and the construction of a new Academic and Arts facility at Heritage High School. The gyms, pool, and cafeteria will remain.



The comprehensive bond proposal is designed to make necessary upgrades and renovations across the school district. The updates to school facilities focus on enhancing student safety and security, upgrading and renovating school facilities to meet the learning needs of Saginaw Township Community Schools students, and updating interior and exterior facility infrastructure (roofs, boilers, HVAC, site, etc.)

The bond proposal requires a 5.7 mill tax increase which will cost the average Saginaw Township Community Schools' homeowner (living in a home with a market value of \$100,000) \$23.95 per month or about 79¢ per day. Most homeowners will pay less, but some will pay more.

How was the bond proposal developed?

Planning for the May 2023 bond proposal started in the summer of 2019 with an in-depth facility review process. Architects and engineers worked with members of the school district's administration to identify short- and long-range needs of all Saginaw Township Community Schools facilities. The review process focused on three key areas:

- 1. Upgrading safety and security;
- 2. Improving the learning environment; and,
- 3. Updating facility infrastructure (roofs, boilers, HVAC).

A project list was developed following the facility review process. Then, a series of focus panels were conducted to gain community, staff, and student input on the proposed bond projects. Questions for focus panelists included what panelists liked about the proposed projects, what questions they had about the proposed projects, and their thoughts on other improvements that should be considered at each facility.

Following the focus panels, all staff and community members were invited to participate in a survey that allowed them to express their opinions about the proposed projects. Community and staff comments were reviewed, and a final project list was developed and submitted to the Michigan Department of Treasury for approval. The Board of Education set the election after receiving approval of the project list from the Michigan Department of Treasury.

Why is the bond proposal necessary?

Voters approved the last bond proposal over 15 years ago (one year after the first iPhone was introduced in 2007). Just like your home, our mechanical systems, roofs, flooring, etc., have worn out and need to be replaced.

This bond proposal is necessary because, like your home, mechanical systems, roofs, flooring, technology, etc., eventually wear out and need to be replaced. In addition, learning environments have changed over the last 15 years. Our learning environments need to be upgraded and additional safety measures put in place to keep students safe and Saginaw Township Community Schools competitive with surrounding school districts.

How will the school district share information about the bond proposal with community members?

School district officials will share information about the bond proposal through community meetings, meetings with parents and staff, direct mailings, social media, the school district website, and the news media. In what order will bond projects be completed?

Design work will begin immediately following voter approval of the bond proposal. Then, a construction schedule will be developed. Safety improvements, critical infrastructure needs, and educational improvements will be the initial priority areas that will be addressed.

All bond proposal projects will be completed by 2027. Every effort will be made to complete construction projects with the least interruption to student learning.

How will staff members be involved in planning updates for the schools where they work?

Staff input regarding updates to their respective buildings will be solicited throughout the planning process and through surveys and meetings with the design team.

Why did the school district decide to tear down the instructional pods at Heritage High School and build a new Academic and Arts facility?

During the facility review, two options were explored: (1) renovating the current facility and (2) constructing a new academic and arts facility. Following input from the community and staff during the focus panels and survey, most participants favored building a new facility. The reasons community and staff members provided to support the construction of a new facility included:

- The current facility has numerous doors and entry points which create security issues.
- The current facility is 51 years old and is in need of major repairs.

- Renovating the current facility would be a Band-Aid approach to address facility needs and replacement would eventually be required.
- The construction of a new facility would allow for improved learning spaces for all programs (Academics, Arts, Industrial Arts, etc.) and provide climate controls, natural lighting, thoughtful teaching and learning spaces, and security improvements.
- While the initial replacement cost is higher to build a new Academic and Arts facility, renovating the current facility and then replacing it down the road doesn't make financial sense.


Will the sinking fund support the bond proposal?

Yes, Saginaw Township voters first approved the establishment of a sinking fund for the school district in the late 1990s. It was last approved by voters in 2018. The Saginaw Township Community Schools sinking fund is primarily used to make ongoing facility repairs and to address maintenance issues. A sinking fund isn't intended for large-scale construction projects.

Since voters first approved the sinking fund, routine maintenance, and repairs, such as the replacement of some boilers, roofs, and computer network servers, have been paid for through the sinking revenue. The sinking fund will continue to be used for repairs and maintenance that are not allowable through a bond.

A bond proposal is a State-approved funding process for a set scope of projects. When voters approve a bond proposal, the school district sells bonds in the authorized amount and uses the proceeds of the sale to pay for those projects in the bond proposal. Bonds are usually paid back in 20-30 years.

In many ways, the bonding process is like a homeowner obtaining a mortgage and making payments over a period of years.



Nine surrounding school districts currently have a higher bond and sinking fund debt than Saginaw Township Community Schools. Saginaw Township Community Schools currently levies 3.9 mills for bond and sinking fund debt. If voters approve the May 2023 bond proposal, Saginaw Township Schools will levy a total of 8.89 mills for bond and sinking fund debt.

Yara was also selected as a Coca-Cola Scholars Program scholarship semifinalist this year.





In January 2022, the <u>Photography Club at Heritage</u> began under the advisement of Stacey Stahl, freshmen school counselor. Mrs. Stahl worked for both LifeTouch and Sears Portrait Studio before becoming a school counselor and wanted to share her love of photography with our students.

The club was initially a failure in terms of participation. Theresa Hausbeck, 9th grade Special Education teacher, approached Mrs. Stahl in the spring with some ideas to improve the club and an offer to be co-advisor. They brainstormed together to write a compelling grant proposal. Mrs. Stahl suggested that club members take senior portraits for free for low-income students as a condition of receiving a grant. Mrs. Hauebeck wrote the proposal, and her hard work was rewarded with \$1,400 to purchase a camera and accessories. Mrs. Stahl purchased a Canon Rebel, a 30 mm prime lens, three fabric backdrops, a backdrop stand, a camera bag, a SD card, an extra battery, and a tripod.

At their first club meeting in September, Mrs. Stahl and Mrs. Hausbeck were thrilled to see 14 students, an increase from the average attendance during the previous school year. In October and November, Mrs. Stahl taught students principles of natural light portrait photography and aperture settings, and they took pictures of seven Heritage seniors for their yearbook photo. Mrs. Hausbeck has written another grant proposal for money to purchase Photography Club apparel for members with the caveat that they offer free family portraits to low income families with students at Heritage.

In the meantime, club members will complete themed challenges like Tradition, Snowflakes, Downtown Saginaw, Water, and In the Garden. They hope to have a Photography Contest to showcase their work to the school. Additionally, Mr. Church, the Video Club advisor, has offered the Photography Club use of his green screen to do some unique projects.

Students may join the club any time. Meetings are usually the second Wednesday of the month after school until 3:30. They meet in Mrs. Hausbeck's classroom.

Saginaw Township Community Schools District Attendance Policy

- Verification of an absence will be accepted up to two (2) days upon the student's return.
- Students absent four (4) or more consecutive days may require documentation (i.e. doctor's note/obituary/funeral notice, etc.)
- Attendance letters will be sent out at 5 and 7 days absent
- Tardy letters will be sent out at three or more tardies. A tardy includes late arrival or early departure.
 - Sherwood and Westdale Elementary: Tardy times- 7:57-8:09a or if leave after 2:23p. A half day absence will be given for arriving 8:10a or after and leaving before 2:23p.
 - Arrowwood, Hemmeter and Weiss Elementary: Tardy times- 7:40-7:59a or if leave after 2:15p. A half day absence will be given for arriving 8:00a or after and leaving before 2:15p.
 - White Pine and Heritage: Students are tardy if they are not in their classroom when the bell rings. An absence will accrue after 20 minutes from the start of class.
- Pre-school through 5th grade: if your student arrives late, you must come into the office and sign them in or it will be considered an <u>unexcused absence</u>.
- Excused or unexcused absences in excess of ten (10) days are subject to parent notification and interventions by administration. Interventions may include meetings, improvement plans, attendance agreements, support plans, etc. This includes nonconsecutive days.
- Absences documented after ten (10) days are marked as unexcused at the district's discretion.
- The County Truancy Officer will be notified of excessive unexcused absences 10 or more cumulative days for the year, after interventions have occurred at the school level.
