# STCS Welcomes New Curriculum Director



# Saginaw Township Schools' Hemmeter Elementary Earns Top State Ranking

Saginaw Township Community Schools' **Hemmeter Elementary** has been named a U.S. News and World Report Best Elementary School. Hemmeter was ranked #15 in Michigan elementary schools and received an overall score of 98.9 out of 100. This ranking puts them in the top 1% of all elementary schools in the state (15 out of 1,272).

Hemmeter Elementary is a kindergarten to 5<sup>th</sup> grade gifted and talented magnet school with an enrollment of approximately 317 students. The school was also ranked #3 in Michigan magnet elementary schools.

Schools are ranked on their performance on state-required tests, graduation and how well the school prepares their students for high school.

"Hemmeter is excited to be recognized as one of the best elementary schools in Michigan," said Hemmeter Principal Jim Bailey. "The award is a testament to the dedication of our entire school community. I could not be more proud of our teachers, support staff, families, and students for working together to make Hemmeter such an amazing school."

# **2024 STCS Millage Renewal on Ballot**

Dear Community Members,

On February 27, 2024, voters will be presented with an important school ballot question. We want to provide information so you are fully informed, as this ballot proposal has significant operational implications for our schools. This is NOT related to the recent STCS bond proposal.

The ballot question pertains to the 18-mill Non-Homestead Operating Millage that is required to be levied by every school district in Michigan to receive the full per pupil foundation allowance. This is part of the basic school funding formula enacted under Proposal A of 1994.

Saginaw Township Community Schools' current Non-Homestead Operating Millage is set to expire on December 31, 2024 and voters will be asked whether to renew it for an additional 11 years. This tax is levied on businesses, industrial, agricultural, and rental properties. It is NOT a tax on a homeowner's primary residence. The operating millage levy (or 18-mill levy) is collected as a portion of our "per pupil foundation allowance" and amounts to just over \$9.6 million annually for Saginaw Township Community Schools.

This equates to approximately \$2,132 per pupil (\$9.6m/4503 students). This operating millage is only a renewal of the millage that will expire with the 2024 tax levy.

A successful renewal would mean a continuation of the tax currently levied for applicable properties. An unsuccessful renewal of this tax would mean the loss of \$9.6 million in operational funding which is used to educate our students and would significantly impact the programs and services currently offered to STCS students. I ask that you help spread this information to your neighbors, friends and the community.

# THE MILLAGE RENEWAL HISTORY AND EXPLANATION

On the ballot for Tuesday, February 27, 2024, will be an operating millage proposal, allowing the school district to CONTINUE to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18-mills on non-homestead property. This is not related to the STCS May 2023 bond proposal. Non-homestead properties are industrial, commercial and some agricultural property and "second homes" located within the district. It DOES NOT include a family's primary residence. This is not a new tax. In 1994, Proposal A was approved by Michigan voters, creating the structure of how Michigan schools are funded. Under the plan, Michigan schools are funded with a total of 24 mills on non-homesteads. This is made up of a statewide millage rate of 6 mills on all property and 18 mills on non-homestead property when approved by local voters.

This structure ensures the State pays the majority of the cost, but to receive full funding of \$9,608 per pupil, schools must levy 18 mills on non-homestead property in their district.

The Headlee amendment to the Michigan Constitution caps property tax increases at 5% or the rate of inflation, whichever is less. Since the rate of growth of property values sometimes exceeds the rate of inflation, the actual tax levy decreases when this occurs. This is called the Millage Reduction Fraction (MRF). Saginaw Township Community Schools' voters have approved the 18 mill non-homestead millage every 11 years. In August of 2012, Saginaw Township voters also approved a Headlee override millage. This originally gave a combined total approval of just under 21 mills. The maximum amount the school district is allowed to levy is 18 mills. The additional mills provided cushion as the rates potentially "rolled back."

Due to the "roll back" as outlined in the Headlee amendment, the total authorized amount is currently 20.2377 mills (only 18 mills are actually levied on non-homestead properties). Due to the large increase in housing prices, this year's "roll back" is expected to reduce our level of millage below the 18 mill threshold, thereby decreasing the per-student funding from the State of Michigan below \$9,608.

This millage was originally approved by the voters in 1994. If you only own your main residence in our district, this tax does not apply.

If this millage does not pass, the State will <u>not</u> replace the difference in the level of funding (\$9.6 million), and Saginaw Township Community Schools will be forced to reduce or cut programs to offset the loss.



# **ABOUT STCS**

The Saginaw Township Community Schools (STCS) is comprised of five elementary, one middle and two high schools within Saginaw Township, Michigan, and serves nearly 4,600 students.

# **MILLAGE RENEWAL FAQ's:**

Since 1994, every school district in Michigan has been <u>required</u> to pass a periodic renewal of an operating millage that is essential to ensure it collects all of its state funding. This millage doesn't impact the taxes of residents and their primary residences and the maximum amount any school district is allowed to levy is a state statutory 18-mills on all non-homestead property. They're not new taxes but instead an essential source of funding the district is required to secure from voters.

# What is Non-Homestead property?

Non-homestead property refers to commercial, industrial, rental and vacation property. It does not include a family's primary residence.

# Is this a new tax?

NO! This is a renewal and restoration of the 18-mills last approved by voters back in August 2012.

# Will my residential school taxes increase?

If the only property you own in the Saginaw Township Community School District is your primary residence, this millage will not cost you anything. The tax is levied on non-homestead properties only.

# What will the money be used for?

This is an operational budget for STCS. This is the funding that puts gas in our busses, keeps the lights on, pays staff salaries, keeps student programs running, etc.

# What happens if the millage doesn't pass?

The 18-mills assessed on non-homestead properties amounts to approximately \$9.6 million annually to support operations including instructional resources, classroom supplies, and teachers. This funding is essential to maintaining the current programs offered by the district. Should the millage not be approved, the district cannot replace this funding with any other source, and those revenues would be lost. Saginaw Township Community Schools would be required to reduce or cut programs to offset the loss.

## What will the ballot language look like?

This proposal will allow the school district to continue to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18-mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for the school district to receive its revenue per pupil foundation allowance and renews millage that will expire with the 2024 tax levy.

Shall the currently authorized millage rate limitation of 20.2377 mills (\$20.2377 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, in Saginaw Township Community Schools, Saginaw County, Michigan, be renewed for a period of 11 years, 2025 to 2035, inclusive, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and 18 mills are levied in 2025 is approximately \$10,540,897 (this is a renewal of millage that will expire with the 2024 tax levy)?

# Why does the ballot language mention 20.2377 mills instead of 18 mills?

The Michigan Constitution requires that millage rates be "rolled back" if taxable values increase more than the rate of inflation. As a result of this roll-back provision, the district is currently only able to levy 17.3466 mills instead of the full 18-mills. The ballot is asking voters to renew the 18-mills, as well as a cushion, in order to restore the millage rate back to the full 18-mills beginning with the 2024 levy. It is against the law to levy more than 18-mills for this purpose.

# When is the election?

The election is Tuesday, February 27<sup>th</sup>, 2024. Note: this is also the Presidential Primary Election. Any person living within the school district who is registered may vote in this election.

# Where can I vote?

In general, residents of the Saginaw Township Community Schools district will vote in the same location for the school election as when voting in a general election. If you are unsure of your voting location or have questions about absentee voting, please contact your township clerk.

the grant. Students planted over 500 plants and bulbs.





# What have you done since graduating?
